MAJORS HOUSE PIANO DEMONSTRATION

ora Gladish was a composer, though not one known widely today even in her native Missouri. Now, 62 years after her death, her music will once again be played – on her own piano at the Alexander Majors House. It's not just any piano. It's a square grand piano that was made in 1875 by Mathuchek in New Haven, Connecticut. The piano, like the one at the John Wornall House, is made of rosewood. Dr. Bruce Prince-Joseph and his assistant, Jim Upton, have restored it. This is a complicated process – a piano has 11,000 parts.

On a butterfly grand piano, the pedal lyre is in the middle. By contrast, on a square grand piano, the lyre is on the right side. As Dr. Prince-Joseph notes, ladies of the Victorian era wore voluminous skirts. Having the lyre on the right side made it possible for them to see the pedal while they played. As with any good square grand piano, the piano at the Majors house has a harp rack, which is made of red felt. When a pianist presses the left pedal, the harp rack slides between the strings and the hammer, so that the hammer hits the felt first. This causes the piano to sound like a harp. Dr. Prince-Joseph says that the great joy in playing a square piano is in using the harp rack. He acknowledges that the harp rack can't be used in a concert hall, because it reduces the level of the sound so considerably that it cannot be heard.

Sarah Cora Gladish, (who was known as Cora), was born on a farm near Higginsville, Missouri, on June 21, 1867. She was the daughter of Isabel Burnett Gladish and James Gladish. Cora was educated at the Lexington Ladies College and Central Missouri State College. She never married, and she was a schoolteacher for many years in Johnson and Lafayette counties. Music was her passion. Her compositions include "Do You Know Why The Lilacs Are Sweetest Of All?," "De Lil' White Coat On De Wall," "America (U.S.)," "For You," "Mother (My Own)," "Shadows or My Last Dream," "United States of America (Stars on the Blue)," "A Precious Gift," and "Our Dear Wild Rose." In later years, Cora resided in Odessa, Missouri. She died on January 2, 1951, in Warrensburg, Missouri. Her obituary noted that she was a member of the Kansas City Branch of the National League of American Pen Women and listed her as an honorary member of the General Assembly of Presidents and Past Presidents of Kansas City.

The demonstration will be held on November 21st in the barn at the Majors house. Dr. Prince-Joseph plans to play in full songs that would have been popular on the frontier. These will include "Campaign Song for Abraham Lincoln," with words by Charles Haynes and music by J.E. Haynes, which board member Tom Taylor has found. The Reverend Jeffrey Hon of New Song Church will be the soloist for "Campaign Song for Abraham Lincoln." Schottishes enjoyed a vogue then, and in addition, Dr. Prince-Joseph will perform selections from the work of composers such as Chopin, Schumann, Schubert, and Bach. Veronica Caine will be the soloist for Cora Gladish's "Our Dear Wild Rose." A private demonstration will be held for the Native Sons and Daughters of Greater Kansas City, followed by a reception and then a demonstration for the public. This Quarter in Civil War History

October 3, 1863 - President Abraham Lincoln issued a proclamation designating the last Thursday in November as Thanksgiving Day. **October 24, 1861** - The first transcontinental telegram in America was sent from San Francisco to Washington, addressed to President Abraham Lincoln from the Chief Justice of California.

November 19, 1863 - President Abraham Lincoln delivered the Gettysburg Address during ceremonies dedicating 17 acres of the Gettysburg Battlefield as a National Cemetery. Famed orator Edward Everett of Massachusetts preceded Lincoln and spoke for two hours. Lincoln then delivered his address in less than two minutes. Although many in attendance were at first unimpressed, Lincoln's words have come to symbolize the definition of democracy itself.



November 24, 1863 - The Battle of Chattanooga took place during the American Civil War as General Ulysses Grant's soldiers scaled heavily fortified Lookout Mountain and overran Confederate General Braxton Bragg's army.

November 30 - American author Samuel Clemens (1835-1910) was born in Florida, Missouri. He wrote books under the pen name Mark Twain including *The Adventures of Tom Sawyer, The Adventures of Huckleberry Finn*, and *The Prince and the Pauper*.

December 20, 1860 - South Carolina became the first state to secede from the Union in a prelude to the American Civil War. Within two months Mississippi, Florida, Alabama, Georgia, Louisiana and Texas seceded. In April 1861, Virginia seceded, followed within five weeks by Arkansas, Tennessee, and North Carolina, thus forming an eleven state Confederacy with a population of 9 million, including nearly 4 million slaves. The Union had 21 states and a population of over 20 million.

December 25, 1868 - President Andrew Johnson granted general amnesty to all those involved in the Civil War.


