Artifact Fact: Wornall Dining Room Sideboard

e are fortunate to have a lovely, antique sideboard in the dining room of the Wornall House. It was donated in memory of Mrs. Ethel Rose Kerdolff by her children, the late Mrs. William Ennis, Mr. George Kerdolff and Mrs. Kathryn Kerdolff Crowe Koslowsky. Mrs. Kerdolff was an active member of the DAR and an avid antiques collector. Her husband, George W. Kerdolff, was a senior partner in the former prominent Kansas City insurance firm Mann, Kerdolff, Kline & Welsh.

The sideboard was donated in 1967, and has been exhibited at the house since the museum opened in 1972. It was purchased by Mrs. Kerdolff from the estate of Mr. Henry Tindall of Fayette, Missouri, in 1939. His



grandparents had brought it from Kentucky when they came to Missouri. The sale was recorded in the Fayette newspaper at the time of the sale. Since the Wornall family came to Missouri from Kentucky, this sideboard is a particularly fitting piece of furniture for the house.

The sideboard is made of mahogany, in the Late Federal style, and dates from the early nineteenth century. It features four rope-turned and carved diamond point pilasters, which separate the three lower sections of the piece. Four doors open to cabinet spaces in the lower section. There are single doors on each end and double doors on the center section. All four doors are made with pointed arches. There are three drawers with wood knobs over the lower section. The sideboard is a beautiful example of the cabinet maker's art as well as useful for storage, for serving, and for display.

New Exhibit A Lifetime of Change at the Wornall House

he John Wornall House Museum is excited to announce its new exhibit, *A Lifetime of Change: The Wornall Family Beyond the Civil War.* The Wornall House, built in 1858, is perhaps most famous for its use as a field hospital during the Civil War's Battle of Westport. However, the Wornall story goes much deeper and touches on themes that are still relevant today, such as the development of Kansas City and the memory of the Civil War.

A Lifetime of Change features newly researched information about the Wornall family, rarely seen family photographs, and family objects not previously on display. The exhibit is on display at the Wornall House from April 25-July 15 during normal public tour hours Wednesday-Sunday. Exhibit admission is included with Museum admission.

A Lifetime of Change is sponsored by the University of Central Missouri.



Volunteer Spotlight: Alice Ergovich

lice Ergovich didn't plan on becoming one of the Wornall House's longest-serving docents when she joined our organization over ten years ago. In the fall of 2007 Alice was a busy woman, working full time both at her career in the insurance industry and as a wife and mother. "I was at a place in my life where I wanted to do something for myself," she remembers. Driving down Wornall Road one day, she spotted a sign at the Wornall House advertising for volunteers. While initially Alice was interested in some casual gardening, her welcoming personality and a latent interest in the Wornall House's occupants soon made her a natural tour leader.



She took to being a docent immediately: "I love meeting the people who come for tours... it is really special when you can see them connecting- either to the Wornall family stories, the battle, the furniture, or items in the kitchen." For Alice, the conversations that can happen spontaneously during a Wornall House tour are a major part of the fun.

Alice has also contributed to the work of preserving the Wornall House's mythology; an avid participant in our annual Ghost Tours, it was she who took the initiative to gather various paranormal tales from older docents who have since moved on. Her compilation of spooky stories is the basis for our popular private Ghost Tours. Her favorite "Wornall ghost" is John Wornall's third wife, Roma, who she sees as an independent, powerful woman. "From the stories I've heard about her she sounds like such a character- someone that you'd invite to dinner and just sit back and listen."

Alice Ergovich can be found at the Wornall House on first and third Sunday afternoons. She is especially looking forward to this year's Garden Tour and to our upcoming exhibit on the Wornall family's lives after the Civil War – join us for those events, or just stop by for an excellent tour from docents like Alice.
